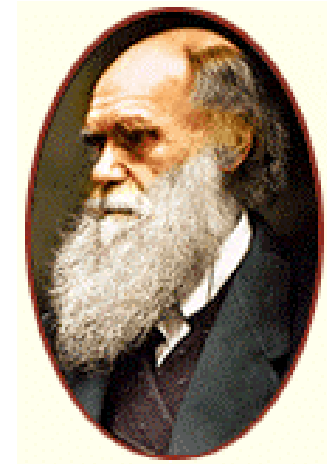

DR. JOHN MITANI

"The Behavior of Wild Chimpanzees"

John Mitani is professor of Anthropology at the University of Michigan. He investigates the behavior of our closest living relatives, the apes. Currently he studies an extremely large community of wild chimpanzees at Ngogo, Kibale National Park, Uganda. During the past 28 years, he has conducted fieldwork on the behavior of all species of apes: gibbons and orangutans in Indonesia, gorillas in Rwanda, bonobos in the Democratic Republic of Congo, and chimpanzees in Uganda and Tanzania. He addresses questions about ape social behavior and communication.

DR. DONALD PROTHERO

"Evolution: what the fossils say and why it matters"

Donald Prothero is Professor of Geology at Occidental College, Los Angeles. He is Phi Beta Kappa and his Ph.D. is from Columbia University. He has authored or edited 25 books and over 200 scientific papers. He has been featured in several TV documentaries. His specialties are mammalian paleontology and magnetic stratigraphy of the Cenozoic. His current research focuses on the dating of the climatic changes that occurred between 30 and 40 million years ago, using the technique of magnetic stratigraphy.
